#### Radiation Performance of Rad Hard HEXFETs

International Rectifier Radiation Hardened HEXFETs are tested to verify their hardness capability. The hardness assurance program at International Rectifier comprises three radiation environments.

Every manufacturing lot is tested in a low dose rate (total dose) environment per MIL-STD-750, test method 1019 condition A. International Rectifier has imposed a standard gate condition of 12 volts per note 6 and a  $V_{\rm DS}$  bias condition equal to 80% of the device rated voltage per note 7. Pre- and post- irradiation limits of the devices irradiated to 1 x 10 $^{\rm f}$  Rads (Si) are identical and are presented in Table 1, column 1, IRHM7230. Post-irradiation limits of the devices irradiated to 1 x 10 $^{\rm f}$  Rads (Si) are presented in

Table 1, column 2, IRHM8230. The values in Table 1 will be met for either of the two low dose rate test circuits that are used. Both pre- and post-irradiation performance are tested and specified using the same drive circuitry and test conditions in order to provide a direct comparison.

High dose rate testing may be done on a special request basis using a dose rate up to 1 x 10<sup>12</sup> Rads (Si)/Sec (See Table 2).

International Rectifier radiation hardened HEXFETs have been characterized in heavy ion Single Event Effects (SEE) environments. Single Event Effects characterization is shown in Table 3.










**Fig 1.** Typical Response of Gate Threshhold Voltage Vs. Total Dose Exposure


**Fig 2.** Typical Response of On-State Resistance Vs. Total Dose Exposure








**Fig 4.** Typical Response of Drain to Source Breakdown Vs. Total Dose Exposure

**Fig 6.** Typical On-State Resistance Vs. Neutron Fluence Level





Fig 7. Typical Transient Response of Rad Hard HEXFET During 1x10<sup>12</sup> Rad (Si)/Sec Exposure

**Fig 11.** Typical Output Characteristics Post-Irradiation 100K Rads (Si)






Fig 12. Typical Output Characteristics Post-Irradiation 300K Rads (Si)




**Fig 13.** Typical Output Characteristics Post-Irradiation 1 Mega Rads(Si)



**Fig 15.** Typical Output Characteristics Post-Irradiation 100K Rads (Si)









Fig 17. Typical Output Characteristics Post-Irradiation 1 Mega Rads (Si)






Fig 18. Typical Output Characteristics






Fig 20. Typical Transfer Characteristics





**Fig 21.** Normalized On-Resistance Vs. Temperature




**Fig 22.** Typical Capacitance Vs. Drain-to-Source Voltage


**Fig 23.** Typical Gate Charge Vs. Gate-to-Source Voltage

**Fig 26.** Maximum Drain Current Vs. Case Temperature




Fig 27a. Switching Time Test Circuit




Fig 27b. Switching Time Waveforms




Fig 28. Maximum Effective Transient Thermal Impedance, Junction-to-Case




Fig 29a. Unclamped Inductive Test Circuit




Fig 29b. Unclamped Inductive Waveforms





Fig30a. Basic Gate Charge Waveform



**Fig 29c.** Maximum Avalanche Energy Vs. Drain Current




Fig 30b. Gate Charge Test Circuit


