

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The 64Mb (x32) DDR SDRAM is a high-speed CMOS, dynamic random-access memory containing 67,108,864 bits. It is internally configured as a quadbank DRAM.

The 64Mb DDR SDRAM uses a double data rate architecture to achieve high-speed operation. The double data rate architecture is essentially a 2n-prefetch architecture with an interface designed to transfer two data words per clock cycle at the I/O pins. A single read or write access for the 64Mb DDR SDRAM effectively consists of a single 2n-bit wide, one-clock-cycle data transfer at the internal DRAM core and two corresponding n-bit wide, one-half-clock-cycle data transfers at the I/O pins.

A bidirectional data strobe (DQS) is transmitted externally, along with data, for use in data capture at the receiver. DQS is a strobe transmitted by the DDR SDRAM during READs and by the memory controller during WRITEs. DQS is edge-aligned with data for READs and center-aligned with data for WRITEs.

The 64Mb DDR SDRAM operates from a differential clock (CK and CK#); the crossing of CK going HIGH and CK# going LOW will be referred to as the positive edge of CK. Commands (address and control signals) are registered at every positive edge of CK. Input data is registered on both edges of DQS, and output data is referenced to both edges of DQS, as well as to both edges of CK.

Read and write accesses to the DDR SDRAM are burst oriented; accesses start at a selected location and continue for a programmed number of locations in a programmed sequence. Accesses begin with the registration of an ACTIVE command, which is then followed by a READ or WRITE command. The address bits registered coincident with the ACTIVE command are used to select the bank and row to be accessed. The address bits registered coincident with the READ or WRITE command are used to select the bank and the starting column location for the burst access.

The DDR SDRAM provides for programmable READ or WRITE burst lengths of 2, 4, 8, or full page locations. An auto precharge function may be enabled to provide a self-timed row precharge that is initiated at the end of the burst access.

As with standard SDR SDRAMs, the pipelined, multibank architecture of DDR SDRAMs allows for concurrent operation, thereby providing high effective bandwidth by hiding row precharge and activation time.

An auto refresh mode is provided, along with a power-saving power-down mode. All inputs are compatible with the JEDEC Standard for SSTL_2. All outputs are SSTL 2.

NOTE: 1. The functionality and the timing specifications discussed in this data sheet are for the DLL-enabled mode of operation.

2. Throughout the data sheet, the various figures and text refer to DQs as "DQ." The DQ term is to be interpreted as any and all DQ collectively, unless specifically stated otherwise.





FUNCTIONAL DESCRIPTION

The 64Mb DDR SDRAM is a high-speed CMOS, dynamic random-access memory containing 67,108,864 bits. The 64Mb DDR SDRAM is internally configured as a quad-bank DRAM.

The 64Mb DDR SDRAM uses a double data rate architecture to achieve high-speed operation. The double data rate architecture is essentially a 2n-prefetch architecture, with an interface designed to transfer two data words per clock cycle at the I/O pins. A single read or write access for the 64Mb DDR SDRAM consists of a single 2n-bit wide, one-clock-cycle data transfer at the internal DRAM core and two corresponding n-bit wide, one-half-clock-cycle data transfers at the I/O pins.

Read and write accesses to the DDR SDRAM are burst oriented; accesses start at a selected location and continue for a programmed number of locations in a programmed sequence. Accesses begin with the registration of an ACTIVE command, which is then followed by a READ or WRITE command. The address bits registered coincident with the ACTIVE command are used to select the bank and row to be accessed (BA0, BA1 select the bank; A0–A10 select the row). The address bits registered coincident with the READ or WRITE command are used to select the starting column location for the burst access.

Prior to normal operation, the DDR SDRAM must be initialized. The following sections provide detailed information covering device initialization, register definition, command descriptions and device operation.

Initialization

DDR SDRAMs must be powered up and initialized in a predefined manner. Operational procedures other than those specified may result in undefined operation. Power must first be applied to VDD and VDDO simultaneously, and then to VREF (and to the system VTT). VTT must be applied after VDDQ to avoid device latch-up, which may cause permanent damage to the device. VREF can be applied any time after VDDQ but is expected to be nominally coincident with VTT. Except for CKE, inputs are not recognized as valid until after VREF is applied. CKE is an SSTL 2 input but will detect an LVCMOS LOW level after VDD is applied. Maintaining an LVCMOS LOW level on CKE during power-up is required to ensure that the DQ and DQS outputs will be in the High-Z state, where they will remain until driven in normal operation (by a read access). After all power supply and reference voltages are stable, and the clock is stable, the DDR SDRAM requires a 200µs delay prior to applying an executable command.

Once the 200µs delay has been satisfied, a DESE-LECT or NOP command should be applied, and CKE should be brought HIGH. Following the NOP command, a PRECHARGE ALL command should be applied. Next a LOAD MODE REGISTER command should be issued for the extended mode register (BA1 LOW and BA0 HIGH) to enable the DLL, followed by another LOAD MODE REGISTER command to the mode register, BA0/BA1 must be LOW to reset the DLL and to program the operating parameters. Two-hundred clock cycles are required between the DLL reset and any READ command. A PRECHARGE ALL command should then be applied, placing the device in the all banks idle state.

Once in the idle state, two AUTO REFRESH cycles must be performed. (tRFC must be satisfied.) Additionally, a LOAD MODE REGISTER command for the mode register with the reset DLL bit deactivated (i.e., to program operating parameters without resetting the DLL) is a requirement. Following these requirements, the DDR SDRAM is ready for normal operation.

Register Definition MODE REGISTER




Figure 1 **Mode Register Definition**

The mode register is used to define the specific mode of operation of the DDR SDRAM. This definition includes the selection of a burst length, a burst type, a CAS latency and an operating mode, as shown in Figure 1. The mode register is programmed via the MODE REGISTER SET command (with BAO = 0 and BA1 = 0) and will retain the stored information until it is programmed again or the device loses power (except for bit A8, which is self-clearing).

Reprogramming the mode register will not alter the contents of the memory, provided it is performed correctly. The mode register must be loaded (reloaded) when all banks are idle and no bursts are in progress, and the controller must wait the specified time before initiating the subsequent operation. Violating either of these requirements will result in unspecified operation.

Mode register bits A0–A2 specify the burst length, A3 specifies the type of burst (sequential or interleaved), A4–A6 specify the CAS latency, and A7–A10 specify the operating mode.

Burst Length

Read and write accesses to the DDR SDRAM are burst oriented, with the burst length being programmable, as shown in Figure 1. The burst length determines the maximum number of column locations that can be accessed for a given READ or WRITE command. Burst lengths of 2, 4, or 8 locations are available for both sequential and interleaved modes. Full page burst is only available in sequential mode.



Reserved states should not be used, as unknown operation or incompatibility with future versions may result.

When a READ or WRITE command is issued, a block of columns equal to the burst length is effectively selected. All accesses for that burst take place within this block, meaning that the burst will wrap within the block if a boundary is reached. The block is uniquely selected by A1–Ai when the burst length is set to two, by A2-Ai when the burst length is set to four and by A3-Ai when the burst length is set to eight (where Ai is the most significant column address bit for a given configuration). The remaining (least significant) address bit(s) is (are) used to select the starting location within the block. The programmed burst length applies to both READ and WRITE bursts.

- **NOTE:** 1. For a burst length of two, A1–A7 select the block of two burst; A0 selects the starting column within the block.
 - 2. For a burst length of four, A2–A7 select the block of four burst; A0-A1 select the starting column within the block.
 - 3. For a burst length of eight, A3-A7 select the block of eight burst; A0-A2 select the starting column within the block.
 - 4. For a full-page burst, the full row is selected and A0-A7 select the starting column. A0 also selects the direction of the burst (incrementing if A0 = 0, decrementing if A0 = 1).
 - 5. Whenever a boundary of the block is reached within a given sequence above, the following access wraps within the block.



Burst Type

Accesses within a given burst may be programmed to be either sequential or interleaved; this is referred to as the burst type and is selected via bit M3.

The ordering of accesses within a burst is determined by the burst length, the burst type and the starting column address, as shown in Table 1.

Read Latency




Figure 2 CAS Latency

The READ latency is the delay, in clock cycles, between the registration of a READ command and the availability of the first bit of output data. The latency can be set to 2 or 3 clocks, as shown in Figure 2.

If a READ command is registered at clock edge n, and the latency is m clocks, the data will be available nominally coincident with clock edge n+m. Table 2 indicates the operating frequencies at which each CAS latency setting can be used.

Reserved states should not be used as unknown operation or incompatibility with future versions may result.

Operating Mode

The normal operating mode is selected by issuing a MODE REGISTER SET command with bits A7-A10 each set to zero, and bits A0-A6 set to the desired values. A DLL reset is initiated by issuing a MODE REGISTER SET command with bits A7, A9 - A10 each set to zero, bit A8 set to one, and bits A0-A6 set to the desired values. Although not required by the Micron device, JEDEC specifications recommend when a LOAD MODE REGISTER command is issued to reset the DLL, it should always be followed by a LOAD MODE REGISTER command to select normal operating mode.

All other combinations of values for A7-A10 are reserved for future use and/or test modes. Test modes and reserved states should not be used because unknown operation or incompatibility with future versions may result.



EXTENDED MODE REGISTER

The extended mode register controls functions beyond those controlled by the mode register; these additional functions are DLL enable/disable. These functions are controlled via the bits shown in Figure 3. The extended mode register is programmed via the LOAD MODE REGISTER command to the mode register (with BA0 = 1 and BA1 = 0) and will retain the stored information until it is programmed again or the device loses power. Although not required by the Micron device, the enabling of the DLL should always be followed by a LOAD MODE REGISTER command to the mode register (BA0/BA1 both LOW) to reset the DLL.


The extended mode register must be loaded when all banks are idle and no bursts are in progress, and the controller must wait the specified time before initiating any subsequent operation. Violating either of these requirements could result in unspecified operation.

Output Drive Strength

The reduced drive strength for all outputs are specified to be SSTL_2. The x32 supports an option for impedance matched drive. This option is intended for the support of the lighter load and/or point-to-point environments. The selection of the impedance drive strength will alter the DQs and DQSs from SSTL_2, Class I drive strength to a reduced drive strength, which is approximately 30 percent of the SSTL_2 Class II, drive strength.

DLL Enable/Disable

The DLL must be enabled for normal operation. DLL enable is required during power-up initialization and upon returning to normal operation after having disabled the DLL for the purpose of debug or evaluation. (When the device exits self refresh mode, the DLL is enabled automatically.) Any time the DLL is enabled, 200 clock cycles must occur before a READ command can be issued.



NOTE: 1. E13 and E12 (BA0 and BA1) must be 1, 0 to select the Extended Mode Register (vs. the base Mode Register).

- 2. BA0-BA1 select either the mode register or the extended mode register (BA0 = 0, BA1 = 0 select the mode register; BA0 = 1, BA1 = 0 select extended mode register; other combinations of BA0-BA1 are reserved). A0-A11 provide the opcode to be written to the selected mode register.
- 3. BA0-BA1 provide bank address and A0-A10 provide row address.
- 4. BA0-BA1 provide bank address; A0-A7 provide column address; A8 HIGH enables the auto precharge feature (nonpersistent), and A8 LOW disables the auto precharge feature.

DESELECT

The DESELECT function (CS# HIGH) prevents new commands from being executed by the DDR SDRAM. The DDR SDRAM is effectively deselected. Operations already in progress are not affected.

NO OPERATION (NOP)

The NO OPERATION (NOP) command is used to instruct the selected DDR SDRAM to perform a NOP (CS# LOW). This prevents unwanted commands from being registered during idle or wait states. Operations already in progress are not affected.

LOAD MODE REGISTER

The mode registers are loaded via inputs A0-A10. See mode register descriptions in the Register Definition section. The LOAD MODE REGISTER command can only be issued when all banks are idle, and a subsequent executable command cannot be issued until ^tMRD is met.

ACTIVE

The ACTIVE command is used to open (or activate) a row in a particular bank for a subsequent access. The value on the BA0, BA1 inputs selects the bank, and the address provided on inputs A0-A10 selects the row. This row remains active (or open) for accesses until a PRECHARGE command is issued to that bank. A PRECHARGE command must be issued before opening a different row in the same bank.

READ

The READ command is used to initiate a burst read access to an active row. The value on the BA0, BA1 inputs selects the bank, and the address provided on inputs A0-A7 selects the starting column location. The value on input A8 determines whether or not auto precharge is used. If auto precharge is selected, the row being accessed will be precharged at the end of the READ burst; if auto precharge is not selected, the row will remain open for subsequent accesses.

WRITE

The WRITE command is used to initiate a burst write access to an active row. The value on the BA0, BA1 inputs selects the bank, and the address provided on inputs A0-A7 selects the starting column location. The value on input A8 determines whether or not auto precharge is used. If auto precharge is selected, the row being accessed will be precharged at the end of the WRITE burst; if auto precharge is not selected, the row will remain open for subsequent accesses. Input data appearing on the DQs is written to the memory array

subject to the DM input logic level appearing coincident with the data. If a given DM signal is registered LOW, the corresponding data will be written to memory; if the DM signal is registered HIGH, the corresponding data inputs will be ignored, and a WRITE will not be executed to that byte/column location.

PRECHARGE

The PRECHARGE command is used to deactivate the open row in a particular bank or the open row in all banks. The bank(s) will be available for a subsequent row access a specified time (trp) after the PRECHARGE command is issued. Input A8 determines whether one or all banks are to be precharged, and in the case where only one bank is to be precharged, inputs BA0, BA1 select the bank. Otherwise BA0, BA1 are treated as "Don't Care." Once a bank has been precharged, it is in the idle state and must be activated prior to any READ or WRITE commands being issued to that bank. A PRECHARGE command will be treated as a NOP if there is no open row in that bank (idle state), or if the previously open row is already in the process of precharging.

AUTO PRECHARGE

Auto precharge is a feature which performs the same individual-bank precharge function described above, but without requiring an explicit command. This is accomplished by using A8 to enable auto precharge in conjunction with a specific READ or WRITE command. A precharge of the bank/row that is addressed with the READ or WRITE command is automatically performed upon completion of the READ or WRITE burst. Auto precharge is nonpersistent in that it is either enabled or disabled for each individual READ or WRITE command.

Auto precharge ensures that the precharge is initiated at the earliest valid stage within a burst. This "earliest valid stage" is determined as if an explicit PRECHARGE command was issued at the earliest possible time, as described for each burst type in the Operation section of this data sheet. The user must not issue another command to the same bank until the precharge time (tRP) is completed.

BURST TERMINATE

The BURST TERMINATE command is used to truncate READ bursts (with auto precharge disabled). The most recently registered READ command prior to the BURST TERMINATE command will be truncated, as shown in the Operation section of this data sheet. The BURST TERMINATE does not precharge the row.



AUTO REFRESH

AUTO REFRESH is used during normal operation of the DDR SDRAM and is analogous to CAS#-BEFORE-RAS# (CBR) REFRESH in FPM/EDO DRAMs. This command is nonpersistent, so it must be issued each time a refresh is required.

The addressing is generated by the internal refresh controller. This makes the address bits a "Don't Care" during an AUTO REFRESH command. The 64Mb x32 DDR SDRAM requires AUTO REFRESH cycles at an average interval of 7.8µs (maximum).

To allow for improved efficiency in scheduling and switching between tasks, some flexibility in the absolute refresh interval is provided. A maximum of eight AUTO REFRESH commands can be posted to any given DDR SDRAM, meaning that the maximum absolute interval between any AUTO REFRESH command and the next AUTO REFRESH command is $9\times7.8\mu s$ (70.2 μs). This maximum absolute interval is to allow future support for DLL updates internal to the DDR SDRAM to be restricted to AUTO REFRESH cycles, without allowing excessive drift in ^tAC between updates.

SELF REFRESH

The SELF REFRESH command can be used to retain data in the DDR SDRAM, even if the rest of the system is powered down. When in the self refresh mode, the DDR SDRAM retains data without external clocking. The SELF REFRESH command is initiated like an AUTO REFRESH command except CKE is disabled (LOW). The DLL is automatically disabled upon entering SELF REFRESH and is automatically enabled upon exiting SELF REFRESH (200 clock cycles must then occur before a READ command can be issued). Input signals except CKE are "Don't Care" during SELF REFRESH.

The procedure for exiting self refresh requires a sequence of commands. First, CK must be stable prior to CKE going back HIGH. Once CKE is HIGH, the DDR SDRAM must have NOP commands issued for ^tXSNR because time is required for the completion of any internal refresh in progress. A simple algorithm for meeting both refresh and DLL requirements is to apply NOPs for 200 clock cycles before applying any other command.




Operations BANK/ROW ACTIVATION

Before any READ or WRITE commands can be issued to a bank within the DDR SDRAM, a row in that bank must be "opened." This is accomplished via the ACTIVE command, which selects both the bank and the row to be activated, as shown in Figure 4.




Figure 5 Example: Meeting ${}^{t}RCD$ (${}^{t}RRD$) MIN When 2 < ${}^{t}RCD$ (${}^{t}RRD$) MIN/ ${}^{t}CK \le 3$

After a row is opened with an ACTIVE command, a READ or WRITE command may be issued to that row, subject to the ${}^{t}RCD$ specification. ${}^{t}RCD$ (MIN) should be divided by the clock period and rounded up to the next whole number to determine the earliest clock edge after the ACTIVE command on which a READ or WRITE command can be entered. For example, a ${}^{t}RCD$ specification of 20ns with a 125 MHz clock (8ns period) results in 2.5 clocks rounded to 3. This is reflected in Figure 5, which covers any case where $2 < {}^{t}RCD$ (MIN)/ ${}^{t}CK \le 3$. (Figure 5 also shows the same case for ${}^{t}RCD$; the same procedure is used to convert other specification limits from time units to clock cycles).

A subsequent ACTIVE command to a different row in the same bank can only be issued after the previous active row has been "closed" (precharged). The minimum time interval between successive ACTIVE commands to the same bank is defined by ^tRC.

A subsequent ACTIVE command to another bank can be issued while the first bank is being accessed, which results in a reduction of total row-access overhead. The minimum time interval between successive ACTIVE commands to different banks is defined by ^tRRD.

Figure 4 Activating a Specific Row in a Specific Bank

READs


READ bursts are initiated with a READ command, as shown in Figure 6.

The starting column and bank addresses are provided with the READ command and auto precharge is either enabled or disabled for that burst access. If auto precharge is enabled, the row being accessed is precharged at the completion of the burst. For the generic READ commands used in the following illustrations, auto precharge is disabled.

During READ bursts, the valid data-out element from the starting column address will be available following the CAS latency after the READ command. Each subsequent data-out element will be valid nominally at the next positive or negative clock edge (i.e., at the next crossing of CK and CK#). Figure 7 shows general timing for each possible CAS latency setting. DQS is driven by the DDR SDRAM along with output data. The initial LOW state on DQS is known as the read preamble; the LOW state coincident with the last data-out element is known as the read postamble.

Upon completion of a burst, assuming no other commands have been initiated, the DQs will go High-Z. A detailed explanation of ^tDQSQ (valid dataout skew), ^tQH (data-out window hold), the valid data window are depicted in Figure 27. A detailed explanation of ^tDQSCK (DQS transition skew to CK) and ^tAC (data-out transition skew to CK) is depicted in Figure 28.

Data from any READ burst may be concatenated with or truncated with data from a subsequent READ command. In either case, a continuous flow of data can be maintained. The first data element from the new burst follows either the last element of a completed burst or the last desired data element of a longer burst which is being truncated. The new READ command should be issued x cycles after the first READ command, where x equals the number of desired data element pairs (pairs are required by the 2n-prefetch architecture). This is shown in Figure 8. A READ command can be initiated on any clock cycle following a previous READ command. Nonconsecutive read data is shown for illustration in Figure 9. Full-speed random read accesses within a page (or pages) can be performed as shown in Figure 10.




CA = Column Address

READ Command





READ Burst





Figure 8 Consecutive READ Bursts






Data from any READ burst may be truncated with a BURST TERMINATE command, as shown in Figure 11. The BURST TERMINATE latency is equal to the READ (CAS) latency, i.e., the BURST TERMINATE command should be issued x cycles after the READ command, where x equals the number of desired data element pairs (pairs are required by the 2n-prefetch architecture).

Data from any READ burst must be completed or truncated before a subsequent WRITE command can be issued. If truncation is necessary, the BURST TER-MINATE command must be used, as shown in Figure 12. The ^tDQSS (MIN) case is shown; the ^tDQSS (MAX) case has a longer bus idle time. (^tDQSS [MIN] and

^tDQSS [MAX] are defined in the section on WRITEs.)

A READ burst may be followed by, or truncated with, a PRECHARGE command to the same bank provided that auto precharge was not activated. The PRECHARGE command should be issued x cycles after the READ command, where x equals the number of desired data element pairs (pairs are required by the 2n-prefetch architecture). This is shown in Figure 13. Following the PRECHARGE command, a subsequent command to the same bank cannot be issued until ^tRP is met. Note that part of the row precharge time is hidden during the access of the last data elements.



Terminating a READ Burst



WRITEs





Figure 14 WRITE Command

WRITE bursts are initiated with a WRITE command, as shown in Figure 14.

The starting column and bank addresses are provided with the WRITE command, and auto precharge is either enabled or disabled for that access. If auto precharge is enabled, the row being accessed is precharged at the completion of the burst. For the generic WRITE commands used in the following illustrations, auto precharge is disabled.

During WRITE bursts, the first valid data-in element will be registered on the first rising edge of DQS following the WRITE command, and subsequent data elements will be registered on successive edges of DQS. The LOW state on DQS between the WRITE command and the first rising edge is known as the write preamble; the LOW state on DQS following the last data-in element is known as the write postamble.


The time between the WRITE command and the first corresponding rising edge of DQS (^tDQSS) is specified with a relatively wide range (from 75 percent to 125 percent of one clock cycle). All of the WRITE diagrams show the nominal case, and where the two extreme cases (i.e., ^tDQSS [MIN] and ^tDQSS [MAX]) might not be intuitive, they have also been included. Figure 15 shows the nominal case and the extremes of ^tDQSS for a burst of 4. Upon completion of a burst, assuming no other commands have been initiated, the DQs will remain High-Z and any additional input data will be ignored.

Data for any WRITE burst may be concatenated with or truncated with a subsequent WRITE command. In either case, a continuous flow of input data can be maintained. The new WRITE command can be issued on any positive edge of clock following the previous WRITE command. The first data element from the new burst is applied after either the last element of a completed burst or the last desired data element of a longer burst which is being truncated. The new WRITE command should be issued x cycles after the first WRITE command, where x equals the number of desired data element pairs (pairs are required by the 2n-prefetch architecture).

Figure 16 shows concatenated bursts of 4. An example of nonconsecutive WRITEs is shown in Figure 17. Full-speed random write accesses within a page or pages can be performed as shown in Figure 18.

Data for any WRITE burst may be followed by a subsequent READ command. To follow a WRITE without truncating the WRITE burst, ^tWTR should be met as shown in Figure 19.

Data for any WRITE burst may be truncated by a subsequent READ command, as shown in Figure 20. Note that only the data-in pairs that are registered

prior to the ^tWTR period are written to the internal array, and any subsequent data-in should be masked with DM as shown in Figure 21.

Data for any WRITE burst may be followed by a subsequent PRECHARGE command. To follow a WRITE without truncating the WRITE burst, ^tWR should be met as shown in Figure 22.

Data for any WRITE burst may be truncated by a subsequent PRECHARGE command, as shown in Figures 23 and 24. Note that only the data-in pairs that are registered prior to the ^tWR period are written to the internal array, and any subsequent data-in should be masked with DM as shown in Figures 23 and 24. After the PRECHARGE command, a subsequent command to the same bank cannot be issued until ^tRP is met.







Figure 15 WRITE Burst





Consecutive WRITE to WRITE





Nonconsecutive WRITE to WRITE





Random WRITE Cycles



Figure 19 WRITE to READ – Uninterrupting



Figure 20 WRITE to READ - Interrupting



WRITE to READ – Odd Number of Data, Interrupting



Figure 22 WRITE to PRECHARGE – Uninterrupting



Figure 23 WRITE to Precharge – Interrupting







PRECHARGE

The PRECHARGE command (Figure 25) is used to deactivate the open row in a particular bank or the open row in all banks. The bank(s) will be available for a subsequent row access some specified time (^tRP) after the PRECHARGE command is issued. Input A8 de-

termines whether one or all banks are to be precharged, and in the case where only one bank is to be precharged, inputs BA0, BA1 select the bank. When all banks are to be precharged, inputs BA0, BA1 are treated as "Don't Care." Once a bank has been precharged, it is in the idle state and must be activated prior to any READ or WRITE commands being issued to that bank.


POWER-DOWN (CKE NOT ACTIVE)

Unlike SDR SDRAMs, DDR SDRAMs require CKE to be active at all times an access is in progress: from the issuing of a READ or WRITE command until completion of the burst. For READs, a burst completion is defined when the Read Postamble is satisfied; For WRITEs, a burst completion is defined when the Write Postamble is satisfied.

Power-down (Figure 26) is entered when CKE is registered LOW. If power-down occurs when all banks are idle, this mode is referred to as precharge power-down; if power-down occurs when there is a row active in any bank, this mode is referred to as active power-down. Entering power-down deactivates the input and output buffers, excluding CK, CK# and CKE. For maximum power savings, the DLL is frozen. Exiting power-down requires the device to be at the same voltage and frequancy as when it entered power-down. However, power-down duration is limited by the refresh requirements of the device, so in most applications, the self-refresh mode is preferred over the DLL-disabled power-down mode.

While in power-down, CKE LOW and a stable clock signal must be maintained at the inputs of the DDR SDRAM, while all other input signals are "Don't Care."

The power-down state is synchronously exited when CKE is registered HIGH (in conjunction with a NOP or DESELECT command). A valid executable command may be applied one clock cycle later.




FIGURE 27A – SSTL 2 CLOCK INPUT

- 6. VREF is expected to equal VDDQ/2 of the transmitting device and to track variations in the DC level of the same. Peak-to-peak noise on VREF may not exceed ±2 percent of the DC value. Thus, from VDDQ/2, VREF is allowed ±25mV for DC error and an additional ±25mV for AC noise.
- 7. Vtt is not applied directly to the device. Vtt is a system supply for signal termination resistors, is expected to be set equal to VREF and must track variations in the DC level of VREF.
- 8. VID is the magnitude of the difference between the input level on CK and the input level on CK#.
- 9. The value of Vix is expected to equal VDDQ/2 of the transmitting device and must track variations in the DC level of the same.
- 10. IDD is dependent on output loading and cycle rates. Specified values are obtained with minimum cycle time at CL = 3. Outputs are open during IDD measurements.

- 12. Idd specifications are tested after the device is properly initialized.

- 13. This parameter is sampled. VDD = +2.5V/+2.65V +0.1V/-0.1V, VDDQ = +2.5V/+2.65V +0.1V-0.1, VREF = Vss, f = 100 MHz, $T_A = 25^{\circ}$ C, VOUT(DC) = VDDQ/2, VOUT (peak to peak) = 0.2V. DM input is grouped with I/O pins, reflecting the fact that they are matched in loading.
- 14. Command/Address input slew rate = 0.5V/ns. For slew rates 1V/ns or faster,tIS and tIH are reduced to 900ps. If the slew rate is less than 0.5V/ns, timing must be derated:tIS has an additional 100ps per 100mV/ns reduction in slew rate from 500mV/ns. If the slew rate exceeds 4.5V/ns, functionality is uncertain.
- 15. The CK/CK# input reference level (for timing referenced to CK/CK#) is the point at which CK and CK# cross; the input reference level for signals other than CK/CK# is VREF.
- 16. Inputs are not recognized as valid until VREF stabilizes. Exception: during the period before VREF stabilizes, CKE ≤ 0.3 x VDDQ is recognized as LOW.
- 17. The output timing reference level, as measured at the timing reference point indicated in Note 3, is $V_{\rm TT}$.
- 18. ^tHZ and ^tLZ transitions occur in the same access time windows as valid data transitions. These parameters are not referenced to a specific voltage level, but specify when the device output is no longer driving (HZ) or begins driving (LZ).



Data Output Timing – ^tAC and ^tDQSCK



Data Input Timing








BANK READ – WITHOUT AUTO PRECHARGE



BANK READ – WITH AUTO PRECHARGE




